Undergraduate Business Program Update

To meet its students' needs and objectives, the Faculty of Business and Management decided to modify its curriculum.

Effective this semester (Fall 2005), business students can plan for a specific area of concentration from the following choices:

- . Marketing
- . Accounting
- . Management
- . Banking and Finance
- . Business Economics

Students who do not want to have an area of concentration can form an ensemble of courses of interest to them.

The following changes have been made to the curriculum,

- The required number of credits for graduation is now 93
- L1200 (Library Use and Research) is now a required course. It is a one credit course and **free of charge**.
